Introduction and Context

Llanvaches Community Council is a small rural village located about midway between the market town of Chepstow and the city of Newport. The village lies just north of the A48 road and below Wentwood, with both Newport centre and Chepstow about 7 miles distant.

The vast majority of the local government services impacting biodiversity are provided by Newport City Council however the Community Council do lease two green spaces, Glebeland Football Field and Wentwood Drive Play area, which have an impact on biodiversity.

We serve 236 residents and the budget for 2025/26 is £11,752. Due to its small size, Llanvaches Community Council currently does not fall under the scope of the Well- Being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015 The Council but seeks to align its activities with its principles where possible.

We promote sustainability and biodiversity by pursuing sustainability goals and sustainable practises whenever possible.

- Objective 2:** Safeguard species and habitats of principal importance and improve their management
- Objective 3:** Increase the resilience of our natural environment by restoring degraded habitats and habitat creation
- Objective 4:** Tackle key pressures on species and habitats
- Objective 5:** Improve our evidence, understanding and monitoring
- Objective 6:** Put in place a framework of governance and support for delivery
